

## Midweek Meditation



"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1

It is the nature of faith to deal with possessions which it neither sees nor feels but handles just as if they were present, though it has no other assurance than the knowledge that God neither lies nor deceives. For example, when I am about to die and death faces me, I must go on; but I do not know where I should place my foot first. Now if unbelief is there, it trembles, shudders, and says: "Where shall I go now? Who knows what is to become of me?" Unbelief always wants to see and feel first where to go; but its ambition is not realized. Therefore it must despair. Faith, however, thinks thus: "I know not where I am going. Go I must. I see and feel nothing; but I will commend myself to Him who has said, 'Cast your burden upon the Lord, and He will sustain you.'" So sharp are the eyes of faith.
