Meditation

"I am the Good Shepherd. I know My own and My own know Me, and I lay down My life for the sheep." John 10:14, 15b

A little boy had tears in his eyes after reciting the 23rd Psalm with the congregation. "What's the matter?" his mother whispered. "Why do we say, 'The Lord is my Shepherd I shall not want?'" he responded, "I do want Him. I love Jesus. Why wouldn't I want Him?" Those tears were tears of faith. Lutheran Foundation Grant

In response to the global COVID-19 crisis, Crisis Response Grants from the Lutheran Foundation were made available to eligible organizations until July 1, 2020. The purpose of these grants is to equip congregations and schools with resources to assist with meeting the unique challenges and opportunities resulting from the Coronavirus pandemic. Specifically, these grants are intended to support activities that are crucial to the fulfillment of the mission of the applicant. Applicants must be one of the following to apply for these funds:

- A Lutheran Foundation Delegate Congregation
- An accredited K-12 school that is a member of the Lutheran Elementary School Association (LESA)

These grants are available for up to \$5,000. Christ Lutheran applied for a \$5,000 grant. Possible uses for this grant include internet upgrades, purchasing video/recording equipment, and assisting families in the congregation and possibly the community who have been especially affected by this crisis. A check for \$4,000 has been received, and an additional \$1,000 check will be forthcoming. We thank God for blessing our congregation with this gift!
